By becoming a leader, not just in the pool, but in the classroom and community can I help swimming gain the attention it deserves. That has been a constant motivator over the past few years when my leadership journey really took flight. From National Junior Honor Society Treasurer to Student Council Representative, every position has given me a platform to be a representative for the sport.

A particularly pivotal experience was my challenges in founding Pulaski Academy's Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter as a freshman in high school. Despite limited administrative support, doubtful peers, and uncooperative teachers, my dedication never wavered, and constant promotion has enabled the club to reach fifty members today.

Additionally, I have been a consistent volunteer at the Central Arkansas Library System, particularly at the teaching garden at Hillary Clinton Children's Library. There I translated physical labor into organic, healthy produce for disadvantaged communities.
