



Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policy (MAAPP) for Team Events

What is MAAPP and where did it come from?

- MAAPP came out of a mandate by Congress to the U.S. Center for SafeSport. The mandate was reduce risk areas for abuse in youth sports. The risk areas addressed by the policy are:
 - One-on-One Interactions
 - Social Media and Electronic Communications
 - Travel
 - Locker Rooms and Changing Areas
 - Massages and Rubdowns





Who needs to acknowledge and follow MAAPP?

- All Applicable Adults must agree to follow MAAPP requirements. Applicable Adults are:
 - All USA Swimming non-athlete members and adult athlete members (aged 18 and over)
 - Participating non-members (e.g. meet marshals, computer operators, timers, announcers)
 - LSC and club adult staff and board members
 - Any other adult authorized to have regular contact with or authority over minor athletes

What is required to show compliance with MAAPP?

• Written acknowledgment by all adult athletes, parents, coaches and other nonathlete members of member clubs and LSCs is required annually.





What about meet volunteers?

- Volunteers (non-member participants) such as safety marshals, lane timers, computer operators, and announcers, will need to abide by MAAPP while volunteering at a meet or other team event.
- They do NOT need take APT, have a background check or become members of USA Swimming.
- They <u>will</u> need to acknowledge and abide by MAAPP while they are participating. The acknowledgement may be covered if they have previously responded to the club as in the case of a parent member of the club. For other non-members participants (i.e. a grandparent that is not a member of the club but helping as a lane timer), they will need to agree to follow MAAPP while they are volunteering.





How do we ensure volunteers know about MAAPP?

- Use the language for briefings document with your volunteers. Adapt it as necessary for the facility that you are in.
 - Starters can use the language with lane timers.
 - Deck referees and meet referees can use the language with officials and coaches.
- Use the summary policy and acknowledgment form for volunteers if there is any question on whether or not they have acknowledged MAAPP.
 - The summary policy has been tailored to address the most common areas where a volunteer will interact with minor athletes.
 - Have a full copy of the policy available in case someone would like to read it or point them to USASwimming.org/MAAPP
 - Ask volunteers to read the summary policy and sign for acknowledgment.
