Competitive Swimming Via USA Swimming

- World Aquatics (Formerly FINA) International governing body for aquatics sports; runs the swimming portion of the Olympics and World Championships
- USA Swimming (USA-S) The National Governing Body for the sport of Swimming in the U.S.; runs the Olympic Trials, National Championships, and Junior Nationals
- Virginia Swimming (VSI) One of 59 Local Swim Committees (LSCs), each of which governs swimming within their geographical territory
- Zones LSCs are geographically located in one of four Zones

Who and What is VSI?

- One of 59 LSCs in USA-S
- Governing body for most of Virginia (except Arlington and Fairfax counties) and 3 counties in North Carolina
- Membership made up of seasonal clubs, year-round clubs, and affiliated group members
- Oversees swimming programs that follow USA-S policies, rules, and regulations
- Governed by a House of Delegates, an elected Board of Directors, and an extensive committee structure



Virginia Swimming Officials Committee

- VSI Officials Chair The Officials
 Committee is a standing committee
 of VSI and is responsible for the
 testing, certification, evaluation, and
 supervision of all officials. The
 Chairperson of this Committee is
 responsible for seeing that these
 functions are fulfilled by the
 Committee.
- District Chair VSI is divided into 4
 districts and these same districts are
 used by the Officials Committee to
 oversee training.
- Club Official Chair Sets up training clinics for new officials and assists training officials with scheduled training sessions at meets. Organizes officials for both home and away meets. Teams first point of contact.

"Just love swimming and I wanted to be involved"




- ★ Attend Introduction to Officiating clinic ✓
- * Attend S&T Clinic or take on-line AO or TEO Clinics
- * Additional off-deck requirements (prior to 4th on-deck training session
 - Register as a non-athlete member [or apprentice official member] of USA-S
 - * Complete a Background Check
 - * Complete Athlete Protection Training
 - * Complete Concussion Protocol Training
 - Pass applicable tests

Steps to Becoming a Certified Official

- * On-deck training requirements
 - Complete required number of sessions of on-deck, position-specific training and track progress on training card
 - * Following satisfactory completion of your last training session, obtain signature of referee validating satisfactory completion of all on-deck requirements
- * Following completion of all off-deck and on-deck training requirements
 - Send a copy of your completed training card to your district officials chair who will enter your certification into OTS

- Available for download on both Apple App Store and Google Play Store
- Integrates with member registration
- * Access to account dashboard
- Displays family member information
- Displays membership card including
 - In Good Standing Until date
 - Background Check expiration date
 - * Athlete Protection Training date
 - Concussion Protocol Training date





Officials Tracking System (OTS)



Training Card

- A position-specific training card will be issued to you at the end of this clinic
- Training must be completed within one year of today
- Fill out the card with your contact information
- Enter completion dates for requirements as they are completed
- Bring the card to each session and give it to the Meet Referee or Chief Judge
- The card will then be used by your assigned trainer to track your knowledge and skill levels at the end of the session
- After both the front and back of the card are filled out following each session of training, a Referee must also sign the card
- At the completion of your training, a Referee must sign the card to validate that you have successfully completed all the on-deck training requirements
- The card should then be sent to your district chair who will complete the certification in OTS.



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Signing Up to Train at a Meet

- * All training sessions must be performed at VSI/USA sanctioned meets. Approval for non-VSI/USA meets or meets outside the LSC requires prior approval of the apprentices District Chair, or the LSC Officials Chair.
- To sign up for a meet contact your team's Official Chair.
- * May also contact the Official Coordinator for the meet attending and sign up. Let your team Chair know.
- Training is on a first come first serve basis and may be limited due to numbers or length of session.



Officials Uniform

* Trainees

- Don't dress as an official, but dressing in a similarly professional manner is encouraged
- Stroke and turn trainees when making calls (usually after the third training session) should dress as officials
- Uniform for certified officials (dry and wet deck)
 - Short-sleeve, white, polo shirt (no team logos)
 - Navy blue shorts, pants, or skirt
 - * White shoes with white socks
- Newly certified officials will receive
 - White, short-sleeve polo shirt with VSI logo
 - Name tag with VSI logo

Trainee Responsibilities

- Keep your Club chair updated with your training progress
- If you sign up show up on time and work the entire session
- Learn the rules applicable to your position
- * All training shall be performed at VSI/USA-S sanction meets
 - Must have approval to train at non-VSI LSC meets (outside of VA LSC)
 - * High School, NCAA and non-VSI sanctioned meets are not acceptable
- Training at either non-VSI-sponsored or at VSI-sponsored championship meets is limited
 - Refer to the VSI Officials Handbook for details
 - Exceptions need to be approved by your District Officials Chair

Certified Official Responsibilities

- Maintain current technical knowledge and philosophical understanding of the rules
- Work at least the minimal number of sessions required annually to recertify
- Fulfill any continuing education requirements
- Maintain current registration status including background check and athlete protection training
- Consider advancement opportunities as you become more knowledgeable and proficient in your officiating position
